Jacmel. We served people for whom healthcare is a luxury. We met people over seventy years old who had never seen a doctor or a dentist. We were able to help over five hundred people during our stay.

The situation in Haiti is deplorable but we were all impressed by the resiliency of the Haitian people. Water is rationed and people are living in tents and using latrines. Conditions are worst in the capital, Port-au-Prince, and this is where the efforts of the international organizations are concentrated. Conditions are more stable in the rural areas we serve but the need is great there too and our help is needed. Several members of our team have taken the time to share their experiences. So many people, so little time. My heart aches knowing that some may have to spend another night with a toothache. It will probably be months or even another year before they have that tooth addressed. But I am only speaking from a dental perspective. Before the earthquake things were tough but the straw that broke the camels back, from my perspective, took place on the afternoon of that 7.0 quake. There is still joy and a deep sense of appreciation for the service that the 18 of us rendered. I am thankful for the 18 hearts that were moved by the Holy spirit to bring joy to a people and a community in need. May God richly bless you all.
